**NOTES:**

**Bush** varieties reach a certain size & pretty much produce in waves, setting many fruit at once, & typically earlier.. Also referred to as "determinate" tomatoes.

**Vine** varieties may reach upwards of 12 feet, but their mature size cannot be determined, & they typically produce most of their fruits later in the year. Also referred to as "indeterminate" tomatoes.

**Pinching suckers** can help to keep Vine tomato plants smaller, but is not necessary for Bush tomatoes.

Tomatoes & Peppers alike are not particularly fond of our Summers or Winters, so simply keep them happy in those seasons, & expect best harvests closer to **Fall & Spring**.
